A Look at Holy Orders

Our look at the seven sacraments continues this week with Holy Orders. The seven sacraments are divided into three categories: sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist), sacraments of healing (Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick) and sacraments of service (Holy Orders and Marriage). These two sacraments are called sacraments of service because they are directed toward the salvation of others. While the other five sacraments are for the benefit of the recipient, marriage and ordination are primarily for the betterment of others.

The whole Church is a priestly people. Through Baptism all the faithful share in the priesthood of Christ. This participation is called the "common priesthood of the faithful." *For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.* (Romans 12:4-8) Based on this common priesthood and ordered to its service, there is another participation in the mission of Christ: the ministry conferred by the Sacrament of Holy Orders, where the task is to serve in the name and in the person of Christ the Head in the midst of the community.

There is only one Sacrament of Holy Orders, but there are three levels. The first is that of episcopate or bishop. He stands in a direct, unbroken line from the Apostles, a condition known as "apostolic succession." Bishops are given a particular diocese to shepherd and teach and his primary responsibility is for the faithful of his diocese.

The second level of the Sacrament of Holy Orders is the priesthood. No bishop can minister to all the faithful in his diocese, so priests act, in the words of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, as "co-workers of the bishops." At their ordination, priests promise celibacy, a responsibility to prayer and obedience to the local bishop. The primary duties of the priesthood are the preaching of the Gospel and performing the sacraments.

The third level of the Sacrament of Holy Orders is the diaconate. Deacons assist priests and bishops in the areas of ministry. There are two kinds of deacons: permanent deacons, who are ordained to act as deacons for the rest of their lives and transitional deacons, who are ordained deacons in anticipation of their priestly ordination.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

There was, perhaps, great significance in the fact that Jesus had "nowhere to rest his head," that he was born in a stable outside of an established inn. Ultimately he would work from outside the recognized religious and political systems of his day. He would also spend his time ministering to "outsiders," the tax collectors, the prostitutes, the lame and the blind. And looking beyond his own death, he told us that we would find him among those outside the mainstream of life. Jesus surely found the "outside" to be an excellent vantage point for work and vision and ministry. The three individuals intent on following Jesus were rebuffed because none of them were willing to stand outside the customs of their day. Had they been willing, they would have had the vantage point necessary not only to be of service to God, but to see what is deserving of time and attention and importance.

2. What outsider role might Jesus assume today? With whom might he be most comfortable?
